WHAT'S THE STORY? FROM THE VICAR

Our church community

To be church is to be part of a movement, not a moment (to borrow a phrase from Hamilton). As people who gather around Jesus and his teachings, we the church are always learning, always growing, always open to being surprised by what God is up to. We the church are the community that gathers, and we are the church everyday, everywhere that we are. We are rooted in Christ as we gather to worship, growing in faith as everyday disciples, and fruitful in love as we seek the well-being of our community. We are who we are because of who Jesus is, not because of what we do.

We thought over Christmas about how God came into the ordinary in Mary and Joseph — **ordinary girl, ordinary boy, extraordinary God**. It is that ordinary that we celebrate – the ordinary that God makes extraordinary. You serve God and worship God in so many (extra)ordinary ways, and all of those contribute to the impact the church has made in your areas. Through time spent listening to each other, sharing meals together, washing up, mowing the lawn. Through gathered worship in the AV, music, flower and hospitality teams, in speaking roles and teaching roles to adults and children. Through organising events like the fairs, AoP, Lent Appeal events, and other charities that you are involved in; through prayerful presence and prayerful absence, walking through joys and sorrows together with honesty, truthfulness and love. You are amazing.

Gathering people together to explore faith more deeply is one of my favourite things, and we did that throughout the year in different ways. This included evening services called Deepening Faith – Growing Character in Lent and beyond, and others focusing on the Holy Spirit, and then teaching on How to Pray With Each Other; with the young people at Satellites, and in the Confirmation Course and the confirmation itself which followed – such a joy to celebrate 12 young people being confirmed! What an impact it was! We also celebrate our small groups, which are a great source of spiritual growth and support, and I am proud that they are all lay-led and Ian and I simply attend. The impact these groups and activities have is beyond measure.

This is why it brings me great joy to be part of this church community locally, and also to represent you to the wider church. Ian and I are often out doing assemblies in the parish or lessons with Sutton Schoolswork (where I am a Trustee), or taking funerals, and we even did a wedding together at St Margaret's Chipstead! We are both active members of our local clergy chapter and Deanery Synod, where I am the Area Dean, as well as the local Church Leaders Collective, and Churches Together. I am on the Bishops Advisory Group for Liturgy, and teach on the Bishops Certificate. These are some of the ways that we engage with the wider church and community, which is a really important part of being a parish church. Thank you not just for what you do, but for who you are, and who we are becoming as a church.

In 2024, I've been overseeing home groups at the Good Shepherd. It's a place where people can come and ask questions, study the Bible, and have meaningful discussions as they grow in their faith. It has been a pleasure to work with the home group leaders who are passionate and dedicated in finding creative and inspirational ways to bring the life of the gospel into people's lives. Thank you. Please do continue to pray for the home group leaders and the individual members of the groups, as they journey through 2025 into 2026.

In March 2025 I went on a pilgrimage to Turkey organised through Southwark Dioceses and visited the seven churches of Asia minor, Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea. Whilst much hilarity was had throughout the pilgrimage, there were long, but rewarding days as we experienced these places. It was a hugely valuable and uplifting time to be able to stand and walk in these places, knowing that some of the apostles came to visit, preach and live during their time of ministry.

Rooted in Christ: Gathered Worship

2024 began by continuing our Christmas theme seeing the **Awe in the Ordinary**, seeking to notice where God is at work in ordinary in life. **Finding Faith** was our lenten theme seeking to discover key moments of the big story of faith, linking in with a series of evening services '**Deepening Faith** - **Growing Character**'. Easter was a joy, as we read the Passion Story, held Maundy Thursday and Good Friday reflections through all-age and a creative walk through the passion, celebrating Easter Sunday with an all-age interactive service with a variety of activities. Thanks to all who joined in enthusiastically! Eastertide took us on a journey looking at '50 Days of Wonder', how the Holy Spirit brings life, going deeper in the evening service. An Ephesians tour, **Growing Up in Christ**, accompanied by teaching in the evening services led by lan and Katrina on **How to Pray With Each Other**, encouraged learning about inviting prayer with each other rather than prayer for each other.

Summer led us to consider the I Am Saying of Jesus, and the young people had another great year at Satellites festival. They explored and developed itchier faith journeys, many of them committing to confirmation in the autumn term. Autumn took us through the book of James 'Wisdom for Life', followed by the book of Job called Ancient Wisdom Rooted in Christ. We completed the year's cycle into Advent and Christmas, with once again fabulous attendance at our various Christmas services, despite the weather challenging us for Carols by Starlight!

Thank you to everyone involved in our gathered worship, from the big and obvious to those busy in the background, and to those who pray quietly for it all. Our **Wednesday Holy Communion service** continues to have a strong regular congregation, as does our Sunday 8.30am **Holy Communion**. Thank you to everyone.

Growing in Faith: Everyday Discipleship

Our faith does not only exist in our gathered worship, and we continue to prioritise growing our faith through **everyday discipleship**, happening through **our small groups**, which include **prayer, bible study, discussion** and helping each other navigate life through the lens of faith. This year, Ian took on overseeing the small groups, and many have seen growth in attendance this year. Once a month the Evening services also gave the opportunity to read the bible together and ponder, pray and chat through faith. Our 'This time tomorrow' feature told us stories of lives within our community as we prioritise faith in everyday life, and I know there are many ways that our faith is expressed through volunteering, and in how we aim to reflect Jesus at work, school, and home. We also said goodbye to Paul and Helen Moore which affected our music teams. 
